

#### **Bell-ringing**

Recently St Peters bells have not been rung anything like as much as they used to be for Sunday services and when there is ringing it may only be four of the eight bells. This is because for one reason or another there are very few ringers left. We really need some new ringers or the bells may fall silent. Most people can learn to ring bells in the traditional way practiced at St Peter's and about 5,000 other Churches in the UK. Children from age 12 can easily be taught; there are as many female as male ringers.

What's involved? The first stage is learning to handle a bell (think of it as a bit like learning to stay on a bike safely). These initial lessons are hands-on, with your tutor closely supervising.

When you can handle the bell safely, you need further exercises to learn how to control it, to make it ring faster or slower (think of it as like learning to cycle in a straight line, and turn corners when required).

Thus far, you have been ringing a bell on its own. The next step is learning to synchronise the timing of your bell with others (think of it as cycling in formation, six abreast). This is what it is all about, and when you can do it reasonably well you will be a full member of the band and can visit other towers to ring.

From now on, most of your training will be in general practices with the rest of the band. They, as well as you, will have things they want to achieve, so the time in practices is shared out, with each piece of ringing (a 'touch') intended to benefit different people. A lot of a ringer's time is spent ringing things to help a fellow ringer. At first, you are mainly a beneficiary, but as you progress, you can increasingly ring things that help other people.
